Dear Mrs. Johnson,

We certainly did appreciate your gifts toward our passage and are sorry to be so slow in acknowledging them. We have been kept busy just settling and living. We have been without a cook about half the time since being back and that means much time has been spent just in preparing food — for example, one day I spent a little over an hour trimming the junk off the meat. Just yesterday we got a young Christian fellow whom we hope to train as a cook, and we hope he will be of help in giving forth a witness here where there are no other Christians.

Your letter requesting us to get some candy for Clyde and family came shortly before we left Carbondale for the Jersey City office, so when we were in Jersey we got a little licorice, but the only orange slices I saw were only cellophane wrapped and I figured they wouldn't stand the trip. However, Bert got some English chocolates on the ship. We didn't get as much candy for them as we had intended to, but they seemed very pleased with it when we gave it to them at conference time.

Phillip certainly is a big boy, and little Gracie is a very cute baby. Leah looks pretty much as she did before we left, as far as I recall, but is just a bit bigger. It was good to see them all again.
