

Alec Moore, a new missionary with the Brethren group died here early Sunday morning the 19th. He had been in Pakistan for just six months; married for three months, and was 24 years old. His wife, Mary, is about 20 years old. They were from Scotland. His death was from encephalitis which is a disease of the brain. We had a good conference again this year, with Rev. Geoffrey King from England as the visiting preacher. His messages on the theme of "Spiritual Health" were very good. The first one, on prayer, I thought particularly good. Mary is having trouble for the third time with infection in her gums. It causes severe pain. She is taking penicillin 4 times a day, and later the infected area will have to be opened and drained. I have had some type of stomach and intestine trouble which may be flu, but it is not liver trouble as I had feared. My hemoglobin is low also, and that explains white I feel so tired. Philip is still going quite good. He walked at 10 months, 9 days, and by now fairly runs. He will be one on August 3rd. I almost forgot the big news! We are expecting a new little one about Feb. 1st. We already have the names chosen. We will be coming home to N. Y. in 8 months, flying from here about the end of March. The passage will be about \$1300 for the four of us. That money is saved for us in our office, so we will not need extra for it. Heavy rains again caused widespread floods in the northern and central areas of Pakistan. Leigh was damaged rather severely by heavy rains. One was recorded as 7 inches in one day. Many houses fell in and at least five people were killed. This is because so many of the houses are either partly or entirely built of mud. We had a letter from our next door neighbor there, who writes that the outside wall (courtyard) of our place fell, but as far as he can see there is no damage to the house itself. Please pray for a young man near Leich who was very interested in Christianity. He said that he believed that Jesus is the Son of God, and that, from a Muslim, is a miracle. The greatest sin in Islam is to say that anyone is equal to God. He wrote me a letter here in Murree, and I answered. Then recently he has not written again. I am afraid his family has forbidden him to see or contact me. There is a terrible fear of someone being converted. People would rather kill their own relative, regardless of how close, than to see one become a Christian. He is about 20 years old, and a teacher. We are beginning to wish we could get back to Leigh. Murree is a pleasant change, but gets wearing at this time of year, when the rains come and housekeeping, particularly laundry, gets more and more problematic in our small apartments. We do, however, appreciate the variety of fruits and vegetables available here -- more like the things we get at home than any other time of year. We have had a lot of wild black-rasberries, and canned both sauce and jam for use this winter. Apricots and plums are mostly some now, but peaches are really nice. Apples and pears are just coming on. Received your letter a couple days ago. Thanks faall the news.
